

#### Pray with the following Scripture passages:

John 21:1-14: 'Come and have breakfast'

Matthew 28:1-10: 'Do not be afraid; I know that you are looking for Jesus...'

**Luke 24:18-35:** *'Were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking to us on the road...'* 

John 20:24-29: 'Blessed are those who have not yet seen and have yet come to believe.'

**2 Corinthians 1:3-7:** ... you patiently endure the same sufferings that we are also suffering. Our hope for you is unshaken...

Matthew 28:16-20: '...and remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age.'

1 John 4:13-19: "We love because he first loved us."


Colossians 1:15-20: "He is before all things, and in him all things hold together."

How can you cultivate a more responsive posture to God's presence in your daily life, particularly in your interactions with others and with the created world?

### The First Principle and Foundation of St. Ignatius

The goal of my life is to live with God forever. God who loves me, gave me life. My own response of love allows God's life to flow into me without limit. All the things of this world are gifts of God, Presented to me so that I can know God more easily, and make a return of love more readily. As a result, I appreciate and use all these gifts of God insofar as they help me to develop as a loving person. But if any of these gifts become the center of my life, they displace God, and so hinder my growth toward my goal. In everyday life, then, I must hold myself in balance before all of these created gifts insofar as I have a choice, and am not bound by some obligation. I should not fix my desires on health or sickness, wealth or poverty, success or failure, a long life or short one. For everything has the potential of calling forth in me, a deeper response to my life in God. My only desire, and my one choice should be this: I want and I choose what better leads to God's deepening His life in me.

#### Pray with the following Scripture passages:

**Psalm 136:** It is he who remembered us in our low estate, for his steadfast love endures forever; and rescued us from our foes,

**Psalm 138:** I give you thanks, O Lord, with my whole heart; before the gods I sing your praise; I bow down towards your holy temple and give thanks to your name for your steadfast love and your faithfulness;

**Psalm 104:** You cause the grass to grow for the cattle, and plants for people to use, to bring forth food from the earth, and wine to gladden the human heart, oil to make the face shine,

**Psalm 118:** This is the Lord's doing; it is marvellous in our eyes. This is the day that the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it.

**Psalm 34:** I sought the Lord, and he answered me and delivered me from all my fears. Look to him, and be radiant; so your faces shall never be ashamed.

**Pray for the Grace:** To ask for what I desire -- A deepening awareness of the power of Jesus' Spirit in us and a growing desire to cooperate with others in the development of a more caring world.

#### Pray with the following Scripture passages:

**Luke 24:36-53:** "You are witnesses of these things. And see, I am sending upon you what my Father promised; so stay here in the city until you have been clothed with power from on high."

Acts 1:1-11: "you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth."

Acts 2:1-24: "suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability."

Acts 2: 42-47: "they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having the goodwill of all the people."

Acts 4:32-37: "There was not a needy person among them, for as many as owned lands or houses sold them and brought the proceeds of what was sold. They laid it at the apostles' feet, and it was distributed to each as any had need."

### Ignatian Contemplation

This method of prayer lends itself well to passages in both the Old and New Testaments that portray persons, places and actions, especially events in the life of Christ. It takes into account the fact that everything we have is a gift from our God and can become a tool for growing closer to our Lord, including our imaginations.

\*Begin by reading the passage over slowly to yourself. As you do so, use your imagination to create the scene in your mind.

\*Try to contemplate each person in the scene. Where are they standing? What do they look like? What are they wearing? What expressions are on their faces? Give a prolonged

look, above all, to the person of Jesus himself (if he is featured in the passage in question). Do not try to explain or understand, just take some time to look around.

\*Try to listen, paying attention to spoken or even implied words. What might they mean? Who might they be speaking to? Does their meaning change when these words are directed at you?

\*Observe what the people in the scene do. Who are they? What might their history be, their sufferings, personal quests, challenges and joys? How do they react? Note their gestures, feelings and attitudes especially of Jesus if he is present.

\*Place yourself actively in the scene. Allow yourself to be involved in what is happening. Besides seeing and listening, try to touch and feel the flavor of what you are experiencing in prayer. Think 'affectively' about your time in this place; How do you feel? What joys or resistances do you feel you should pay attention to as a result of spending time in this place?

End your time of prayer with an intimate thank-you and farewell to God. You might use the words of the Lord's Prayer or words of your own choosing.

Take time to jot down any thoughts or feelings you have experienced during this time of prayer in your journal.

### lectio Divina

This is a simplified form of Lectio Divina. The same text from Scripture is read, prayerfully three times. Each reading is followed by a period of silence as one reflects on the scriptures using the guide below;

- 1) The First Reading is for the purpose of hearing the Word. When a word or phrase touches your heart receive it gratefully and silently repeat it to yourself in the silence that follows. After a period of silence speak out loud a single word or phrase that has caught your attention. You may wish to take a moment to jot this word or phrase down in a journal. Take a few minutes (5 or 10) to repeat this gift from God over to yourself. Don't analyze it, just receive it as gift.
- 2) The Second Reading Is for the purpose of 'seeing' or paying attention to Christ in the text, especially as it relates to your own personal situation. As you read the passage a second time, pay attention to the images or ideas that come to mind in relation to the word or phrase the Holy Spirit gave to you on above. What images or ideas does this word or phrase bring to mind? How do you feel as you focus on that image or idea?
- 3) The Third and Final Reading Is for the purpose of connecting the Word of God to our particular lived experience and for experiencing Christ "calling us forth". As you read the passage through a third time ask; Why has Christ brought these particular things to mind today? What is occurring in your personal life, your area of ministry, or your time in this program that these phrases, images and ideas may be speaking to? What might Christ be asking of you? What might you do as a result? Leave some space for silence before this time of prayer closes.
- 4) To close Jot down in a journal a few key points that you want to make sure you remember. These could include; the word or phrase God brought to mind, the image or emotions that accompanied this word or phrase, the connection between these things and your current life situation, and the action or change you would like to make as a result of this time in prayer. End this prayerful time with a prayer of thanks to God, the Lord's prayer, or the Glory be.



#### **How to Pray the Examen**

- 1. Place yourself in God's presence. Give thanks for God's great love for you.
- 2. Pray for the grace to understand how God is acting in your life.
- 3. Review your day in light of the graces you are been asking for during this retreat recall specific moments where you've encountered these graces and your feelings at the time.
- 4. Reflect on what you did, said, or thought in those instances. Why might God want you to pay particular attention to these instances?
- 5. Look toward tomorrow think of how you might collaborate more effectively with God's plan. Be specific, and conclude with the "Our Father."
